Focus on research for a specific project assigned to students. Come to the Central Resource Library to find out which databases are best for the topic at hand, how to optimize searches using keywords, and evaluate sources for bias. Librarians will guide students in constructing their search, and then bridging from information collection to synthesis.

Every student needs a current, valid library card. With a library card and PIN, students can:

• Have online access to newspaper, magazine, and reference book articles through library databases. These are available anywhere you have internet access. (Typically, the library is not able to archive physical newspapers, magazines, or reference books.)

- Log in to their individual accounts to renew materials, place holds, and check due dates.
- Log in to their individual accounts to create booklists, write reviews and rate books they read (age 13 and older only).

Communication = essential for success

When students use the library to complete an assignment, we want to ensure they will have a positive experience. Consulting with our staff before an assignment is made can:

- Help teachers assess what kinds and quantities of materials are available for students to use. If students are told to access materials that we don't own, we can request these from another library system but they will need to factor that extra delivery time into account (up to six weeks).
- Help teachers direct students towards the best resources for their reading and developmental level.
- Help teachers to become aware of what is currently being published on their topic, so that students do not look for materials that don't actually exist. We can make custom booklists and provide professional reviews and resources for teacher use (allow at least two weeks).

• Help teachers ensure that each student has a current, valid library card so that they are able to actually check out materials and look up books in our catalog and on our databases.

- Booktalking (motivating readers through the description of book plots, often on a theme)
- Exhibiting at school events to promote library resources to the community
