COMMUNITY

Lackman Neighborhood Library's Chris Koppenhaver took two overflowing boxes of books to the first **Guys Read after-school book club** of the new school year at Apache Elementary in Overland Park. A total of 31 elementary-aged guys checked out more than 30 books and opened six new library cards. The club's teacher also promoted the Library's eLibrary by projecting an eBook for a read-along activity.



Staff members at **Corinth and Cedar Roe Neighborhood Libraries** continue their transition to working together as sister locations. Refined schedules have staff working at both locations and both floors of Corinth.

Information Services Manager Kim Gile was elected 2nd Vice President of the **Kansas Library Association** (KLA), beginning a 4-year term that ends in the KLA Presidency.

With Kansas City preparing for its first taste of playoff baseball in 29 years, **former Royals great Willie Wilson** visited Antioch Neighborhood Library in September for a Meet the Author event attended by 26 adults and three children. Wilson talked about the personal stories of struggle and triumph captured in his book, "Inside the Park: Running the Base Path of Life." The Prairie Village Post and two local TV news stations covered the talk.





Shawnee Neighborhood Library hosted a **Patron Appreciation Day** on Sept. 13 complete with baked treats and other giveaways. One patron commented, "Thanks for being an awesome library and part of an incredible system!"

The first in a series of **Tertulias Latinoamericanas**, or Latin-American social gatherings on the arts, took place at Oak Park Neighborhood Library in September. The event included myths and legends shared by audience participants and indigenous music interpreted by Amado Espinoza. The highlight of the evening included a dramatic interpretation of Walimai, a short story by Chilean writer Ysabel Allende.

Patrons with a fine or fee balance on their Library accounts began receiving **weekly email notifications** in early September highlighting those balances along with summaries of materials checked out, nearing due dates and holds ready for pickup. 
